CAN DO!

The stats are mind boggling. You've got 61 kids, recycling almost 80,000 cans, equaling 3.15 tons of aluminum, in an eight week period. Some people can barely get a half dozen cans rinsed and in their bin each week. The Can-Do contest has illustrated what education, motivation, and reward can reap. Not only that, we all know this had to be a community effort. Families and friends contributed to the effort. This became a learning opportunity for all. What started as a simple event devised to celebrate America Recycles Day has become an evolving and growing effort towards making things better, and protecting our environment. We congratulate all who participated. Now for the specific kudos!

The winning classroom in McDonough County was Elaine Gate's 4th grade class at Colchester Elementary School collecting 38,780 cans. In Warren County, Laurie Painter's 4th grade class from Immaculate Conception School collected 55,836 cans. Both winning classes are awarded an all expense paid trip to the Museum of Science and Industry's "Reusable City" in Chicago.

The other Can-Do Contest students were from Mrs. Burke's class from Warren Elementary School and Stephanie Kerr's class from Colchester Elementary School. Without their robust participation, this year's contest would not have been so successful!

New IEPA Guidelines Proposed for Recycling Facilities

If it is up to the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA), there may be new regulations for area recycling centers to follow in the future. Recently proposed at an IEPA meeting were two major areas it wishes to address, which entail the issuance of permits and clarifying the definition of a recycling facility from a waste storage facility or transfer station.

Newly established regulations would be specifically designed for facilities termed as the "Post Consumer Recyclable Material Depots" (facilities that only accept material from generators), and the "Post Consumer Recyclable Material Collection Facility" (a recycling facility that accepts material from a third-party, such as a waste hauler, or where material is managed).

The IEPA intention in establishing new regulations is to clearly define what a recycling facility is, and to stop the spread of more problem sites that are currently in existence around the state.

Another meeting is scheduled January 9, 2003 at 11:00 am, at the IEPA offices in Springfield to further discuss the proposed regulations.

What to do with the
BIG WHITE STUFF!



In most cases regular trash pick up will not take old refrigerators and water heaters. Unfortunately, because of this, many end up in ditches along a country road, or benignly wait in a garage or basement.

Here is some information you might find valuable. The **Monmouth Transfer Station/Compost Site** just off South 11th St. in Monmouth, Illinois, will accept and properly dispose of these types of items. Disposal costs are as follows:

\$15.00 - Refrigerators

\$10.00 - Stoves, washers, dryers

\$5.00 - Water heaters, window air conditioners

\$8.50 - Six bags of household trash

\$20.00 - Level pickup truck load of construction debris (old bricks, lumber, sheet rock, shingles, etc.)

Drive to the site, check in with the office personnel and unload. It's just that easy.

The Transfer Station is open Monday through Friday, 8:00 am to 4:00 pm and Saturday 8:00 am to noon. If you have any questions about other large items that will not go in your regular trash, call

Haulers have until February 1 to post 2003 license decal

All residential waste haulers must be licensed to haul waste in the Tri-County area. The purpose of the license is to collect waste data that is reported annually to the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency and to insure the proper disposal and handling of residential waste.

All residential waste haulers must display a sticker on the truck windshield in the right hand corner that identifies that they have complied.

All decals must be displayed by February 1, 2003. Violators are subject to a \$500 fine.

Hitting the Road to the Museum of Science & Industry

At that time, everyone came together to watch the Omnimax film "Titanica." After the film, the group toured the lovely International Holiday Trees exhibit in the rotunda, stopped in at the gift shop, and then loaded onto the bus for the trip home.

When asked about the favorite exhibits, most of the kids picked the flight simulators, the coal mine, and the German U-505 which will be closed to the public soon until 2004 for repairs and re-positioning of the sub. A new subterranean room is to be established.

 Children can enjoy the magic of Christmas tree long after it's time to pull off the tinsel and put away the ornaments. If you don't want to put your tree out for curbside pickup right away, then create a sanctuary in your backyard for birds and small animals. The tree will provide animals with hiding places from predators and safe havens during storms. Make your tree a delectable treat by tucking pine cones that have been coated with peanut butter and rolled in bird seed into the branches. While you're at it, add stringed raisins too.
